Tackling Educational Underachievement

Educational Underachievement is one of the most significant and complex challenges facing society in Northern Ireland. To support innovative, interdisciplinary research in this vital area and provide evidence-based responses to the challenges of educational underachievement, Stranmillis has created and launched a new Centre for Research in Educational Underachievement (CREU).

Speaking at the launch, Director of Research and Scholarship, Dr Noel Purdy, commented: "Maximising the potential of every child and building better futures is a strategic priority for Stranmillis. Educational underachievement is highly complex and multi-faceted. Numerous studies suggest that underachievement is closely correlated with social disadvantage, and that many of our children and young people face enormous barriers to learning, both inside and outside the classroom. Through the new Centre, we will be working to extend and deepen our understanding of educational underachievement and offer evidence-based responses to the challenges: responses that will inform not just policy but everyday teaching and learning in the classroom".

The launch, which was addressed by Will Haire, CB, Chair of Trustees of the Joseph Rowntree Foundation, was attended by over 60 key educational stakeholders from schools, universities, statutory and voluntary sectors, as well as elected representatives from all the major political parties.
