The Northern Ireland Ambulance Service recently launched a joint initiative with CCEA, the Education Authority and the four teacher education universities to integrate a "train the trainer" model for Emergency Life Support, including CPR, into the teacher education curriculum.



Health Minister Robin Swann, who attended the launch, said: "The training to both undergraduate and post graduate student teachers is a huge step forward in ensuring as many people as possible are trained in this life saving skill. These teachers will pass the skills onto their pupils, increasing the community of people who are trained and helping to improve survival rates of those suffering a cardiac arrest."




